Yahoo Finance Article Says CNE One of America's Top 10 Charities:

The Center for Neighborhood Enterprise has been named one of the top 10 charities in the nation in an article entitled "The Best Charities in America" by Mainstreet's Greg Bocquet on Yahoo Finance. The ranking is based on CNE's very low administrative costs (.02%) and its four-star rating by Charity Navigator. The Center is eighth on the list. Bocquet says the groups were selected not only because they have low administrative costs, but because they have received Charity Navigator's perfect rating of four stars. The four star rating provides an overall efficiency assessment based on multiple metrics. CNE'S 2010 RESULTS!!

Violence-Free Zone:

- ✓ 11 Milwaukee high schools with the VFZ posted an overall 17% reduction in violent incidents, a 51% reduction in non-violent incidents, and an average 32% reduction in suspensions for the first quarter, 2010-2011 school year (Sept.-Nov.)
- ✓ The 8 Milwaukee high schools with the program in the 2009-2010 school year posted reductions of 6% in violent incidents and 21% in non-violent incidents compared to increases of 36% and 21% respectively for all MPS high schools.
- ✓ Richmond's George Wythe High School had reductions of 68% in truancies, a 26% drop in fighting, and a 55% decrease in minor physical altercations.

Training and Technical Assistance for Community-Based Organizations:

- ✓ CNE's technical assistance team provided almost 500 hours of face-to-face technical assistance and 44 hours of group training to 20 community organizations in Washington, DC.

Financial Literacy Education:

- ✓ The CNE/HSBC team and CNE's community partners conducted 120 adult financial literacy workshops in 2010, providing training to 3823 low and middle-income adults in 11 states and Washington, DC.
